Message from the Principal

It is with great pleasure and anticipation that I welcome you who are reading the *Maury Update* for the first time as you are the families who will have children enrolled at Maury as Freshmen in 2007-08. Welcome, Class of 2011!

High schools begin earlier than middle schools: at 7:25 a.m. with dismissal at 2:10 p.m. We are on an "alternating block"

schedule which means your child will take 8 classes: 4 each on alternating days. Classes last approximately 90 minutes. Thus, on "A" days students go to blocks 1, 3, 5, and 7, then on "B" days they attend blocks 2, 4, 6, and 8. Two years ago, Norfolk Public Schools wisely decided to add an eighth block to the schedule thus allowing students to enroll in a class that emphasizes the skills

needed to be successful in their high school careers and beyond —without losing opportunities to take the 7 academic and elective classes that they would have taken in the past.

Now, I would like to encourage you to begin the Maury experience during the summer. First, be

condition called Multiple Sclerosis, a cause for which his orchestra students raised \$1,700 in the fall through donations to the Multiple Sclerosis Society. He said he was very touched by their efforts.

“It wasn’t my idea. The kids asked, how come we haven’t done anything for MS yet?” he said.

Featherer came to the Maury faculty 10 years ago just out of college. He plays the viola and plans to

pursue conducting as a career. His titles at Maury include director of orchestras, head of the fine arts department and co-sponsor of the 2007 graduating class.

Featherer says he is very proud of his orchestra students as well as the upcoming graduates, with whom he has been involved since their freshman year. “They are all great kids,” he said. The accomplishments of orchestra students as well

as the seniors who have followed Featherer’s leading are unusually high. This graduation class, for example, is the largest in memory at Maury.

“The teachers are really pushing kids to graduate on time,” Featherer said, “but these kids have been positively involved since day one.” The class has participated in web-based voting to choose guest speakers, homecoming royalty and class officers.
